You should include the types of suitable irrigation systems for recycled grey water. 	A larger minimum tank size of 4500l has been recommended in response to submissions lodged and further research into standard tank sizes. This is investigated further in the Council report. The policy has been amended to remove reference to plumbing to the hot water service in response to Department of Health policy. Reference to kitchen water as grey water is to be removed, it is considered 'black water' and is plumbed to the sewerage system.

Modeling has shown that variation in rainfall caused by a drying climate has little influence on the yield obtained from water tanks. In addition to the benefits identified in Section 1 – Background the draft Policy will also: • Increase security of water for individual lot owners through decentralized supply; • Augment additional water supply infrastructure deferring the need for additional water supply and distribution infrastructure; • Reduce the requirement for storm water infrastructure in new development; • Reduce energy and greenhouse emissions. DAFWA should be consulted as to appropriate sizes for rainwater tanks. Section 7.2 is worded in a confusing manner. Section 8.1 relates to grey water recycling systems. Reuse from kitchens is not recommended. Whilst the Shire is not considering mandating grey water	Additional information to be added to the background part of the Policy in response to the issues raised by the Department of Water. DAFWA were consulted regarding tank size, and this resulted in the recommended increase to minimum tank size to 4500l. Section 7.2 is to be clarified and reworded. Reuse from kitchens for grey water systems is to be removed. In regard to additional incentives for grey water reuse systems, there are no Shire fees involved or approval process. This lies with the Department of Health (DOH) and is largely a State matter. There is little the Shire can do to provide incentives for grey water reuse systems besides raising their profile and encouraging their use (as such as through this Policy). Once the DOH approve more grey water reuse
